

A note from the Playwright about Serhii Lymansky

In September of 2022, I saw a friend's Facebook post about Ukrainian environmentalist and researcher - Serhii Lymanskyi, who for the longest time remained in proximity to the frontline, taking care of the Chalk Flora Resort in Donetsk Oblast. He has been working at this nature resort - home to many endangered species including relict pine trees - since 1988. The area has already witnessed fighting on its territory in 2014 but after the full-scale invasion by Russia in 2022 it has been bombed heavily. Serhii lost his home in April after a bomb landed in his house. He miraculously survived by leaving the house 30 seconds before the explosion for the backyard shelter. He left the village shortly thereafter. The character of Dmytro is inspired by him and in contrast to Daryna is someone who spent most of his life in nature and was willing to die for it rather than leave.

During the destruction of Serhii's house, he lost his camera. One of the main means he documented the Reserve's Nature, the state of plants, and record of destruction by the Russian Invasion. 




The Discarded, by Tianding He (China) is a thought-provoking, experimental, work-in-progress performance that combines live theater, object performance, and multimedia installations to shed light on the impact of waste and migration on individuals and communities. Inspired by the themes of George Büchner's Woyzeck, The Discarded presents a poetic performance that explores the intertwined journey of a piece of garbage used by a New Yorker and sold to developing Asian countries to become new products, and an Asian immigrant who immigrated to New York and eventually becomes a garbage collector. Both of them travel across the globe, experiencing deconstruction, ambition, self-doubt, and revelation. These two stories seem unrelated at first, but as the journey goes on, their trajectories begin to overlap. The performance invites the audience to engage with the characters on a deeper, more personal level, as they confront the realities of waste, migration, and the human condition.



Conceived during the global coronavirus pandemic, *The Sacrifice of Cassamba Becker* is a monologue written and performed by João Victor Toledo (Brazil). The play, whose central character is Cassamba Becker, the grande dame of Brazilian theater that made a dump on some beach in Brazil her home, discusses urgent issues such as poverty, consumerism, global warming, and political crisis. *The Sacrifice of Cassamba Becker* is at heart a political-marginal imagination that wants to rethink the present moment to envision something broader and sexier, in order to transform the garbage of the world into housing, sacrifice into freedom, and thus imagine a place where it is finally worth living.





Steppe by Masha Makutonina (Ukraine) is a one-act play that tells an intergenerational story of an unexpected friendship against the backdrop of an ecological disaster. The story is inspired by the effects of war in Ukraine on the Chalk Flora Nature Reserve and the unexpected revelations that appear in places of purgatory. In a lobby of an administrative government office, partially under reconstruction, two people wait. Dmytro is a 50-year-old environmentalist who has been taking care of Kreidova Flora Nature Reserve in Ukraine before the war forced him to leave. Daryna is an economics student who is here to obtain her indefinite stay. Over the course of three brief visits to the government center, they strike an unexpected friendship.

DERYA CELIKKOL (Host)

Derya Celikkol is a Turkish actor and production designer based in New York. She has had the pleasure of performing in theatrical productions at La Mama, Dixon Place, Rattlestick and Players Theatre amongst other NYC venues. She has performed as a lead in over 100 shows of

the critically acclaimed *Unmaking Toulouse-Lautrec*, for which she was an original devising member. She has starred in numerous films including *Daria the Great* for which she received a Best Actress Award at the Lionshead Film Festival and Fairytale of New York with a wide theatrical release in Turkey. Her production design work consists of award winning feature and short films, TV shows and commercials. She has also directed and produced films that gained her awards and festival selections all over the world. She is a proud graduate of the Experimental Theatre Wing/Tisch School of the Arts.



HAHNJI JANG (Host)

Hahnji Jang (they/them) is an activist stylist and costume designer using their passion for the fiber arts to upcycle garments and offer affordable affirming styling outside the limiting size and gender binaries of capitalism. They have collaborated with Broadway Green Alliance to create

sustainable design resource guides as well as bringing their intersectional costume design practice to theaters across the United States and Asia. They are on a continual journey to decolonize the closets of the individuals and institutions around them. JAMES CLEMENTS (Line Producer)

James Clements (he/him) is a Scottish actor, writer, theatermaker, arts educator and producer based between New York and Scotland. Clements has performed at venues including La Mama E.T.C., HERE and MITU580, and has been on the creative team for projects at Rattlestick

Theater, Lincoln Centre LCT3 and the 92nd Street Y. His source-based experimental plays include The Diana Tapes (2016), Four Sisters (2017), Beauty Freak (2018), MEDEA/ BRITNEY (2019), Ellis Island (2021) and Brothers in Arms (2022). These plays have been described by critics as "magnifying" (TimeOut), "intricate" (BroadwayWorld), "compelling" (The Guardian), "affecting" (Playbill) and "intellectual" (Theatre is Easy), and have been performed in cities across the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom. He has taught at CUNY Queens College and the Wuhan Institute of Design and Science and is an Affiliated Instructor at NYU Tisch School of the Arts. He is Co-Founding Artistic Director of What Will the Neighbours Say? and an Artist-in-Residence with the Brooklyn Arts Council and BRIC. About the Artists



CHANTAL BILODEAU (Panelist)

Chantal Bilodeau is a Montreal-born, New York-based playwright and translator whose work focuses on the intersection of storytelling and the climate crisis. She is the founding artistic director of the Arts & Climate Initiative, an organization that uses theatre to foster dialogue about our

global climate crisis, create an empowering vision of the future, and inspire people to take action. Her play *Sila* earned her a Woodward International Playwriting Prize as well as First Prize in the Earth Matters on Stage Ecodrama Festival and First Prize in the Uprising National Playwriting Competition. Her plays have been presented in a dozen countries and translated in three languages. She is working on a series of eight plays that look at the social and environmental changes taking place in the eight Arctic states. In 2019, she was named one of "8 Trailblazers Who Are Changing the Climate Conversation" by *Audubon magazine*.



UNA CHAUDHURI (Panelist)

Una Chaudhuri is Collegiate Professor and Professor of English, Drama, and Environmental Studies, and Dean for the Humanities at New York University. She is a pioneer in the fields of eco-theatre and Animal Studies. Her recent books include *The Stage Lives of Animals: Zooësis and*

Performance, Animal Acts: Performing Species Today (co-edited with Holly Hughes) and The Ecocide Project: Research Theatre and Climate Change (co-authored with Shonni Enelow). Chaudhuri has been an active member of the theatre community in New York, serving as a judge for the Obie Awards and as a voter for the Tony Awards. Chaudhuri participates in numerous collaborative creative projects, including the multi-platform intervention Dear Climate and the theatre group CLIMATE LENS.



NANA DAKIN (Panelist)

Nana Dakin (she/her) is a queer Thai-American director of new work, classics and devised performance based in NYC. Her work pursues social equity by examining the way culture is constructed and unsettling dormant biases. Recent: AGAIN (Theater Mu), EURYDICE (American Shakespeare

Company), MAMMELEPHANT (Superhero Clubhouse/122CC), LOST COAST (The Playwrights Realm INK'D Festival), SORRY/NOT SORRY (Ars Nova ANT Fest), LOVE LETTER TO A SEED (Clubbed Thumb Winterworks), WHITE PEARL (Royal Court Theatre), RICHARD III (Lenfest Center for the Arts). Nana is an alum of the NYTW 2050 Directing Fellowship, Clubbed Thumb Directing Fellowship, Civilians R&D Group and is currently part of the 22/23 Writer Director Lab at Soho Rep. She is a core member of B-Floor Theatre, Thailand's most highly awarded theatre company, and of Superhero Clubhouse, a company that creates theater to enact climate and environmental justice. Alejandro Fajardo is a Colombian lighting designer based in Lenapehoking/Brooklyn. Alejandro strongly believes that art, creativity, and imagination can guide our communities through the current crises we face and build a new future that centers community care and growth. He works as a

lighting and production designer for theatre, opera, and dance. Alejandro has also designed escape rooms, a series of theatrical immersive games, site lighting for music festivals, and various New York Fashion Week shows. TIANDING HE (Panelist)

Tianding He (she/her/ta), originally from China, is a theatre director, object performance deviser, and arts leader based in New York City. She is the founding artistic director of B·O·N·D International Virtual Performance Festival, and an arts leader of NYFA's Incubator for Arts & Culture

Leaders of Color in the Tri-State Area. She is passionate about exploring innovative ways of storytelling that encompass a range of bodies, including those from minority communities such as Asian, female,

immigrant, and disabled communities, as well as non-human objects. Through her work in object performance, physical theatre, and cutting-edge technologies, she hopes to challenge the anthropocentric ideology that permeates society.

Tianding has directed various productions with CHUANG Stage, including How I Disappeared, A Deal (reading), Ted x Zoo; past works have been presented at venues and festivals including HERE Arts Center, La Mama, Dixon Place, Margo Feiden Gallery, Soho Gallery, and Williamsburg Arts Nexus in NYC and Brooklyn, Pao Arts Center in Boston, Shanghai Theatre Academy in China; Rattlestick Global Form Theatre Festival, Object Movement Festival, Irvine Writer's Festival, Wuzhen International Theatre Festival in China, B·O·N·D International Virtual Performance Festival, Segal Center Film Festival on Theatre and Performance, International Virtual Toy Theatre Festival, and UNFIX Festival. Additionally, she has produced Off-Broadway shows at Theatre Row and IATI Theatre and line-produced at HERE Arts Center, and has explored the embodiment of alienated female experience through selected photography projects.

Alex is a writer and theatre-maker based in London. He co-wrote and performed in *How to Save a Rock* with Pigfoot Theatre in 2019. It was the UK's first carbon neutral theatre show and won the Samuel French New Play Award, the Camden People's Theatre Award and the Sunday Times Playwriting Prize at

the National Student Drama Festival that year. It later played at the Edinburgh Fringe 2019 at Pleasance.
